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the Indian rulers in the North-West, Chandragupta got control over the strategic region of Afghanistan and the treaty with Seleucas was sealed with a matrimonial alliance. Simultaneously he had to ensure lasting peace in the land and counter any attempt that might be made by the disaffected nobles and supporters of the old regime. These two tasks, simultaneously undertaken, must have kept him confined to the Northern Indian plains and hill regions. It is believed that he abdicated his authority after his objective was achieved and retired into the shades of the penance groves. So it is safe to conclude that his travels outside the empire must have been undertaken before he got involved in the war of annihilation against the Nandas. To some extent, this agrees with the theory of South Indian origin and his travels in search of his fortune.

The fact that Arthaśāstra had been accepted as an authoritative text in Ancient Kerala speaks about the greatness of the work on one hand and the discerning mind of the rulers and the people on the other. The people of our country had the tradition of accepting what is good irrespictive of region or place of origin, ancient or of contemparary origin. It was the earlierst among the playwrights of Kerala who asserted - गुण: प्रमाणं न दिशां विभाग: । Vālmīki, Vyāsa, Kālidāsa, Bhāsa, Kauṭilya and Jayadeva were all as acceptable to the people of Kerala even as the products of Kerala poets like Mukundamala, Kṛṣṇakarṇāmṛtam and Nalodaya were acceptable to the people of Kashmir, Bengal, Gujarat and Rājasthan. So far as Kauṭilya's Arthaśāstra was concerned, without being satisfied with the original







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
